HOME CARE PACKAGES PROGRAM

Data Report 3rd Quarter 2017-18

1 January – 31 March 2018

August 2018



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Executive Summary

- There are now more people in home care than ever before, with 77,918 people in care at 31 December 2017. This represents an increase of 5.0 per cent since 30 September 2017 and an annual increase of 13.5 per cent since 31 December 2016.
- There were around 9,100 new entries to home care in the December 2017 quarter.
- There has been growth in the number of approved home care providers, increasing choice for senior Australians. At 31 March 2018, there were 853 approved home care providers with a home care service. This represents an increase of 5.8 per cent since 31 December 2017.
- 41,993 home care packages were released in the March 2018 quarter.
- There were 31,240 approvals for a home care package in the March 2018 quarter.
- At 31 March 2018, there were 54,821 people in the National Prioritisation Queue (the queue), who were either in, or assigned, a home care package.
- The average maximum exit amount was \$250 at 31 March 2018, a decrease of \$16 (or 6.0 per cent) since 31 December 2017.
- 40.4 per cent of providers had indicated that they will not deduct an exit amount at 31 March 2018, up from 37.7 per cent at 31 December 2017.

INTRODUCTION

OVERVIEW

The Australian Government recognises that people want to remain living independently in their own homes for as long as possible. To support this, the Government subsidises packages through the Home Care Packages Program to provide home-based care that can improve older Australians' quality of life and help them to remain active and connected to their communities.

This report provides an update on the operation of the Home Care Packages Program for the period between 1 January 2018 and 31 March 2018 (referred to as the March 2018 quarter for the remainder of the report).

This report consists of four chapters:

- Chapter 2: the delivery of home care services.
- Chapter 3: the prioritisation of people in the national queue.
- Chapter 4: maximum exit amounts.

Data in this report was collected from information systems and records held by the department and the Department of Human Services. Data was valid on the date of extraction.

SCOPE OF THE REPORT

Where possible, data is provided for the period between 1 January 2018 and 31 March 2018. Due to a lag in data availability for some indicators, particularly those dependent on receipt of provider claims, earlier time periods are reported on. Data extracted at a later date may differ.

This data does not reflect the impact of changes to the Home Care Packages Program made beyond 31 March 2018, including any 2018-19 Budget measures.

1. ELIGIBILITY AND ASSESSMENT

DISTRIBUTION OF HOME CARE PACKAGE LEVELS

- There are four levels of home care packages to help meet the different levels of care needs, which are determined by the outcome of an aged care assessment (Table 1).

* The maximum government contribution increases each year. The individual amount that will be paid depends on whether you're asked to pay an income-tested care fee.

- Following the introduction of the Increasing Choice reforms on 27 February 2017, approvals are now made at a specific package level (1, 2, 3 and 4) instead of being made in broad bands (level 1-2 or level 3-4). People with a broad-banded level 1-2 or 3-4 approval (i.e. people who were approved before 27 February 2017) were automatically deemed to be approved at the highest level of their broadband, i.e. either at level 2 or level 4.
- This has resulted in more people on the National Prioritisation Queue for a level 2 and in particular, a level 4 package.

HOME CARE APPROVALS IN THE MARCH 2018 QUARTER

- There were 31,240 total home care approvals in the March 2018 quarter (Table 2).
- The department is working collaboratively with the state and territory assessment workforce to achieve consistency of assessment across Australia including both package level and priority for service. This is to ensure approvals are made in line with the *Aged Care Act 1997* and that people with a high priority get linked with care as quickly as possible. Work continues to support assessment practices that ensure equity of assessment and therefore access to support, regardless of location.

2. HOME CARE SERVICE DELIVERY

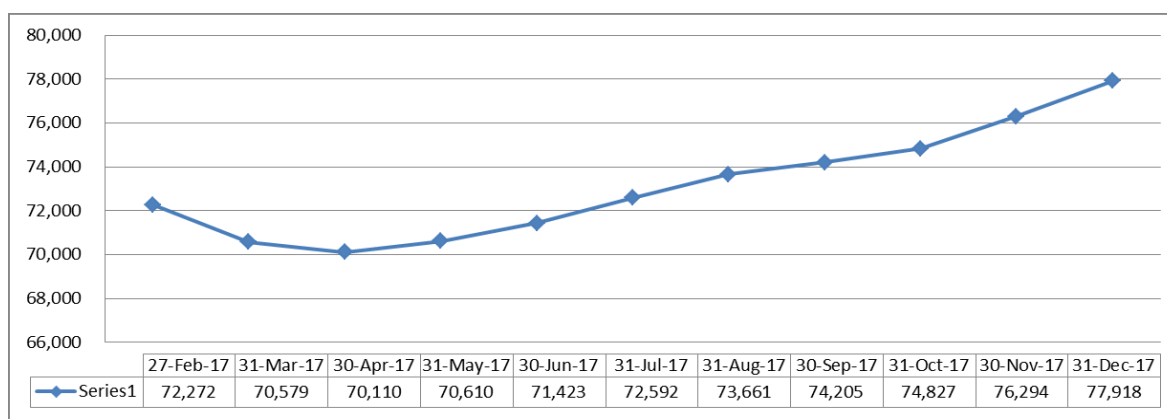
NUMBER OF PEOPLE IN A HOME CARE PACKAGE

- Several people can benefit from the release of a single home care package over the course of the year, as people move between home care levels or leave the home care system. As an example, at 30 June 2017 there were around 71,000 people in a home care package, however over the course of 2016-17, around 97,000 people accessed support through a home care package. This means that on average, approximately 1.4 people access each available package throughout a year.
- There are now more people in care than ever before. At 31 December 2017, there were 77,918 people in a home care package (Table 3). This represents an increase of 5.0 per cent (or 3,713 people) over the December 2017 quarter (Chart 1).
- Between 30 June 2017 and 30 September 2017, most Aged Care Planning Regions (ACPR) had experienced a net increase in the number of people in care between 30 September 2017 and 31 December 2017 (refer to Appendix A).

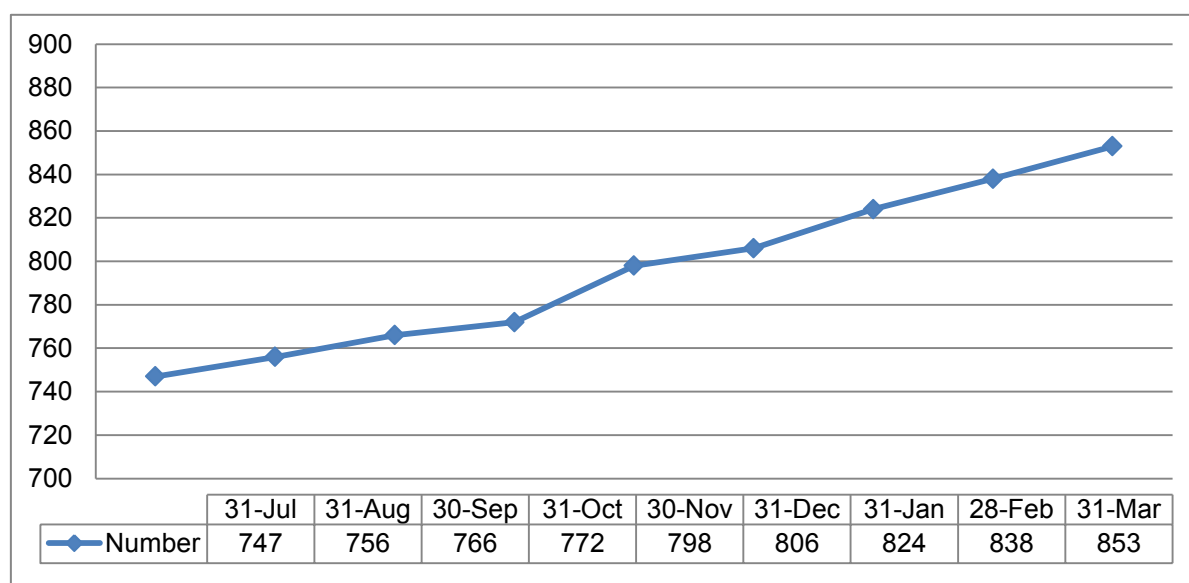

NUMBER OF APPROVED HOME CARE PROVIDERS

- There has been growth in the number of approved home care providers in the market, increasing choice for senior Australians.
- There were 853 approved home care providers at 31 March 2018 (Chart 2). This was an increase of 5.8 per cent from 31 December 2017.

3. NATIONAL PRIORITISATION SYSTEM

NATIONAL PRIORITISATION QUEUE

- The home care system allows for a nationally consistent and fair process for assigning home care packages based on people's individual needs and circumstances, regardless of where they live.
- The efficiency of home care package assignment is reliant on consistency of assessment nationally and educating people on opting out of the queue if they are not actively seeking home care services, or additional services through a higher package level are not currently required.
- There is no disadvantage for the person if their care needs increase and they later choose to opt back in. Their place on the national home care queue is based on their original approval date and priority.
- At 31 March 2018, there were 54,821 people on the queue who were either in, or assigned, a lower level home care package (Table 6).
 - This figure is 14.4 per cent (6,898) greater than the 31 December 2017 figure.
- A further 53,635 people on the queue were either not in, or assigned, a lower level home care package (Table 6). Of those, it is estimated that around half were accessing CHSP services.
- The remainder of people on the queue were not currently receiving care, however they may have exercised their choice not to accept a lower level package or receive services through the CHSP while they wait for a package at their approved level.
- To maximise choice, people with approvals for both home care and residential care remain on the queue until they enter into care, or inform My Aged Care that they are not seeking services.
- It is important to note that not everyone on the queue will enter home care. Many people have approvals for both home and residential aged care, and will choose to take up a residential place instead of a home care package.
- People with a broad-banded level 1-2 or 3-4 approval (i.e. people who were approved before 27 February 2017) were automatically deemed to be approved at the highest level of their broadband, i.e. either at level 2 or level 4. This has resulted in a large number of people on the queue for a level 2 and in particular a level 4 package.
- At 31 March 2018, 41,951 (74.1 per cent) of people on the queue for a level 4 package were either in, or assigned, a lower level home care package.

- The number of people in the queue at 31 March 2018, by ACPR, who were not either in, or assigned, a lower level package is provided in Appendix D.

WAIT TIMES

- All people approved for a home care package, and seeking services on the queue, can access their individual expected wait time to receive their first package, and their approved package level.
- Wait time varies depending on the person's individual circumstances, including how long they have been waiting for care and their priority for home care.
- People approved for a higher level package have the option of receiving a lower level package to commence receipt of care as early as possible. The package will be automatically upgraded when a package is available at a higher level. Receiving a lower level package will not delay their receipt of a higher level package.
- Some people's care needs may be sufficiently met through a lower level package than they are approved for. These people can opt out of the national home care queue to avoid an automatic upgrade to a higher home care package level if additional services are not currently required. There is no disadvantage for the person if their care needs increase and they later choose to opt back in. Their place on the national home care queue is based on their original approval date and priority.
- Estimated wait times for a person joining the medium queue for a package by level is provided in Table 7.

NUMBER OF HOME CARE PACKAGES RELEASED

- The department plans releases to efficiently allocate and control the release of new home care packages into the system within the growing budget allocation. This has allowed the number of consumers in care to steadily increase while also ensuring that the market is able to respond to demand and grow sustainably.
- The department released 41,993 home care packages (or around 3,300 each week) to people over the March 2018 quarter (Table 8 and 9):
 - 82.2 per cent (34,518) of packages were released to people who had not been assigned a package;
 - 17.8 per cent (7,475) of packages were released as upgrades to people who had previously been assigned a lower level home care package;
 - 2.3 per cent (981) were released to people identifying as Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander.

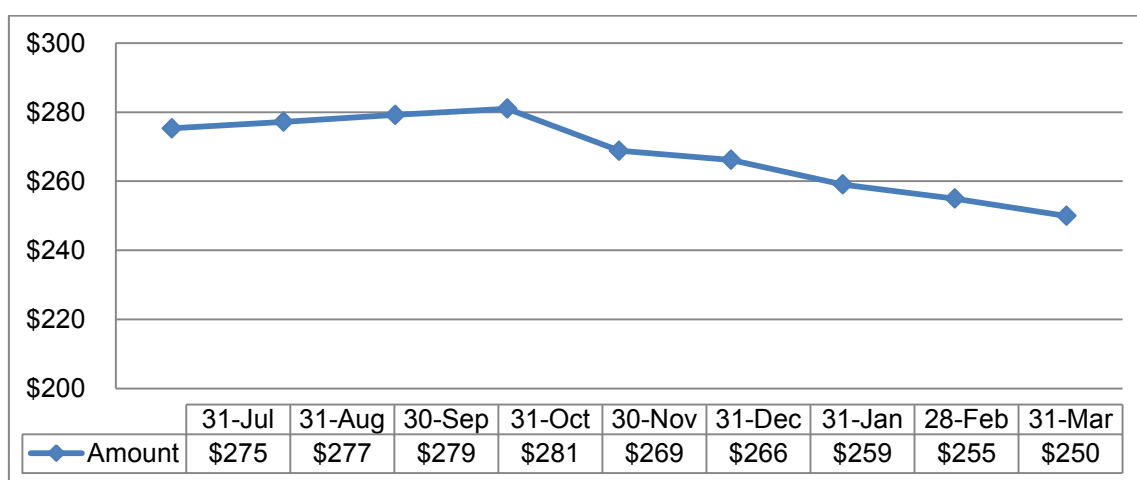
4. MAXIMUM EXIT AMOUNTS

An exit amount is an amount that can be deducted, by a home care provider from a person's unspent home care package amount if the person leaves their care. This may happen if the person decides to change their home care provider or when they leave home care altogether.

The maximum exit amount represents the highest dollar value the provider can include in a person's home care agreement and must be published on the My Aged Care website.

- The average published maximum exit amount of all providers at 31 March 2018 was \$250 (inclusive of amounts of \$0 and where no amount is provided) (Chart 3) and had dropped by \$16 (or 6.0 per cent) over the March 2018 quarter.

- 40.4 per cent of providers had indicated that they would not deduct an exit amount, up from 37.7 per cent at 31 December 2017.
- The number of providers publishing a maximum exit amount of more than \$1,000 at 31 March 2018 was 12. This figure has fallen since 31 December 2017 (Table 10).

Glossary

Term	Definition
<i>Aged Care Act 1997</i>	The primary legislation governing the provision of aged care services.
Aged Care Assessment Teams (ACAT)	ACATs are teams of medical and allied health professionals who assess the physical, psychological, medical, restorative, cultural and social needs of older people and help them and their carers to access appropriate levels of support.
Aged Care Planning Region (ACPR)	The areas marked out in the ACPR maps which can be found on the department's website .
Approved provider	An organisation that has been approved to provide home care under the <i>Aged Care Act 1997</i> .
The department	Means the Department of Health.
Exit amount	An amount that can be deducted by a home care provider from a person's unspent home care package amount if the person leaves their care.
Home Care Packages Program	A program that supports older Australians with complex needs to remain living at home through a coordinated package of care and services to meet the individual needs of people.
Lower level package	A package at a lower level than a person's approved level, through which they are able to access some home care services while waiting on the queue for a higher level package.
Modified Monash Model (MMM)	Is a geographical classification system, using up-to-date population data, which the Government uses to better address the maldistribution of medical services across Australia. Further information can be found on the doctorconnect website .
My Aged Care	The main entry point to the aged care system in Australia.
National Prioritisation Queue (the queue)	The order in which people have been placed for a home care package assignment, according to the time and date of their approval for home care and their priority (medium or high).
National Prioritisation System	The nationally consistent process for allocating home care packages based on peoples' needs and circumstances.
Notified home care service	An approved provider that has notified the department of the home care service through which it will provide care and is eligible for home care subsidy under section 46-1 of the <i>Aged Care Act 1997</i> .
