
Commonwealth Home Support Programme (CHSP)

The Commonwealth Home Support Programme (CHSP or home support) provides entry-level support for older people to live independently in their homes and communities. This fact sheet presents highlights from the GEN CHSP dashboard, as well as data from other published reports.

People using home support


Figure 1: Proportion of people using aged care by program type, 2021–22

In 2021–22, over 818,200 people accessed home support, accounting for three-fifths of people using aged care (Figure 1).

The number of women using home support was nearly double that of men (Figure 2). Approximately 2.1% of people using home support were aged under 65, while over half (53%) were aged 80 years and over.

The Modified Monash Model (MMM) classification system defines whether a location is a city, rural, remote or very remote. MM 1 is a metropolitan area, including Australia's major cities, and MM 7 is a very remote community, such as Longreach. In 2021–22, 63% of people using home support lived in metropolitan areas (MM 1), 11% lived in regional centres (MM 2), 25% lived in rural areas (MM 3–5) and 1.8% lived in remote areas (MM 6–7) (Figure 3).

Characteristics of people using home support


Of people using home support in 2021–22:

- 2.9% were Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander (First Nations) people
- 21% were from non-English-speaking countries
- 13% had a carer (family members, friends or neighbours who provide regular care and assistance)
- 61% were in private residences owned by themselves or their family
- 38% were living alone, and 26% were living with their spouse or partner.

Organisations and services


In 2021–22, more than 1,400 organisations were funded to deliver home support services to people. Around 76% of people using home support received either one or two service types. Slightly over 5% received five or more service types (Figure 4).

Domestic Assistance was most commonly used, with over 329,600 people receiving this service (40% of all people using home support) (Figure 5).

Funding and fees

Home support is a grant-funded program. During 2021–22, the Australian Government provided over \$2.8 billion for the delivery of home support services. The average grants funding per person in home support was approximately \$3,475; however, there is significant variation in funding between people.

The top three services by expenditure were: Domestic Assistance (20% of total home support funding; \$558 million), Social Support Group (11%; \$313 million), and Nursing (10%; \$293 million) (Figure 6).





Some people using home support may contribute to the cost of their care. In 2021–22, Cottage Respite services had the highest average total fees: \$844 per person over the year (Figure 7). The services with the greatest amount of fees spent overall were: Domestic Assistance (\$76 million), Meals (\$57 million) and Home Maintenance (\$21 million).
